**JUL 13**      ***The Lost City of Z: a tale of deadly obsession in the Amazon***  
by David Grann  
(2009, Non-fiction, 339 pgs.)

After stumbling upon hidden diaries, Grann sets out to solve the greatest exploration mystery of the 20th century: what happened to explorer Percy Fawcett and his quest for the Lost City of Z.

**AUG 17**      ***Telex from Cuba***  
by Rachel Kushner  
(2008, fiction, 322 pgs.)

A riveting debut novel set in the American community in Cuba during the years leading up to Castro's revolution. The first novel to tell the story of the Americans who were driven out in 1958.

**SEPT 21**     ***Let the Great World Spin***  
by Colum McCann  
(2009, Contemporary fiction, 349 pgs.)

National Book Award 2009 winner offers a dazzling and hauntingly rich vision of the loveliness, pain and mystery of life in New York City in the 1970s.

**OCT 12**      ***Tales of Terror and Detection***  
by Edgar Allan Poe  
(1833-1844, 96 pages)

Five stories that reveal Poe's virtuoso gifts for crime detection and the macabre, including "The Mystery of Marie Roget" and "The Purloined Letter" which introduces C. Auguste Dupin, the first fictional detective.

**NOV 16**      ***Olive Kitteridge***  
by Elizabeth Strout  
(2008, fiction—stories, 286 pgs.)

Pulitzer prize-winning novel in stories about a hardscrabble Maine town seen through the eyes of Olive Kitteridge, a retired schoolteacher, who like a planetary body, exerts a strong gravitational pull on the entire town.
