- HealthFinder
www.healthfinder.gov
Includes a large collection of health topics at a variety of reading levels, a collection of online quizzes, and information on finding doctors and insurance.
- Healthy Roads Media
www.healthyroadsmedia.org
Offers health information in many languages and in different formats including easy-to-read fact sheets, video, and multi-media tutorials.
- KidsHealth
www.kidshealth.org
Colorful website with health information for kids, parents, and teenagers. Learn about basic anatomy, look up a specific illness, or play health information games.
- Medlineplus
www.medlineplus.gov
Offers health information in print and in the form of interactive tutorials with text, sound and graphics. Topics include diseases, tests, and treatment options.
- NIHSeniorHealth

Designed especially for older adults. Includes health topics of interest to older adults and features that help make the site easier to use.
- Noah: New York Online Access to Health

Features definitions, care and treatment, causes and risk factors, warning signs, diagnostic test information and description about surgical procedures.

Offers plain language print material for common health problems, medication use, and diet. Also contains tools for improving health literacy such as a *New Medication Form* and a *Health Literacy Manual* for health care providers.
