## LOCAL DEPARTMENT.

This valley was quite generally visited by a white frost on Saturday morning last.

The Rev. Jos. A. Somerville will preach in Prospect St. Hall to-morrow morning at 10:30 o'clock, and at 7:45 P. M. Also at the Point of the Mountain in the open air at 3 P. M.

The improvements on the north side of the river, consisting of the opening of the road from the bridges on the lower part of Blackwell st. to J. S. Dickerson's, are rapidly approaching completion, and bid fair to make this continuation in every way equal to the noble avenue that forms the main artery of our town.

Mr. Geo. McCracken, tired of waiting for the appearance of our enterprising town authorities, (who are studying economy,) has graded and curbed his sidewalk in Blackwell st., and made other improvements which will be an example for his neighbors to follow.

A grand temperance rally under the auspices of the New Jersey Catholic Total Abstinence Union, will take place on Thursday evening next 8:00 inst. in Tabernacle Hall, Dover, at half-past seven o'clock. Jas. W. O'Brien, of Jersey City, President of the Union and several other distinguished speakers will address the gathering. All are invited to attend.

Decorations Day, (Thursday next), will be appropriately observed in Rockaway by services in the Presbyterian Church at 2 o'clock P. M. The day being a legal holiday it is expected that all places of business will be closed, at least during the afternoon, and that all citizens will join in the exercises of the day.

On Tuesday evening last a public meeting of the citizens of Chester was held at the Cross Roads hotel to consider the project of better communication and easier and cheaper facilities for the transportation of iron ore by railroad. Samuel Swazey, Esq., was elected chairman and Mr. Smith E. Hodges, secretary. Mr. John Webb, Jr. explained the object of the meeting, which was to also ascertain the sentiment of the people as to the desirability of extending and changing the present route of the Chester R. R. through the village instead of its running on from its present terminus. After a discussion of the matter a committee consisting of Nathan A. Cooney, Philip Welsh, Caleb Osborn, Theo. Topping, John H. Vanderwerf and John Webb, Jr., was appointed to confer with the Messrs. Taylor, of High Bridge, or other parties who might be authorized to act for the R. R. Co., in regard to the change, to ascertain if it is practicable and upon what terms it could be brought about. The committee was instructed to call another meeting as soon as they are able to report.

Very extensive developments of iron ore have been made in the village of Chester and vicinity of late, and such is the rapid growth of the business that better railroad facilities are demanded, the present mode of transporting ore by horses and wagons a distance of from one to one and a half miles being considered not only a slow and tedious process but too costly. Chester is situated upon an elevated plateau of ground, and to reach the railroad requires the descent of a long and steep hill. The mines of Hacklebarney, two miles south of Chester, have lately proved to be among the richest in the county, and to reach the present railroad terminus with teams would greatly increase the cost of ore delivery. The proposition by the railroad company was to continue the road from the present depot on through German Valley and tap the Hacklebarney mines with a branch road of one mile and a half. But this would still leave the numerous mines now working and others that will likely be shortly opened in and north of Chester as far from the railroad as ever. The object then is to continue the railroad from Hometown, about three miles north of Chester along the main ore arteries, through the village to Hacklebarney and thence on south, which would make the road no longer, (when the Hacklebarney branch above mentioned is considered,) and besides the greater facilities to passengers, would give such advantages of loading ore directly from the mines into cars as would save in the course of a year many thousands of dollars.

The citizens of Chester are acting with commendable liberality in this matter, and offer the ground on which to build the new extension as a free gift, and certainly the inducements to mining men would be such as to increase the amount of ore lifted and therefore increase the amount of freight.

The Messrs. Taylor, manufacturers of car wheels and axles at High Bridge, and who recently bought the Gulick property near Chester with its valuable mineral privileges for \$40,000, have lately leased the property of Mrs. Hodges and are negotiating for other leases, the object being to insure ore for furnaces which are about to be erected by them at High Bridge.

There is a great demand in Chester for hire houses, and much trouble is experienced in keeping men in the place because of the inadequate supply. The rapid increase in population ought to induce the rapid erection of buildings, we should think, as a matter of speculation. At any rate Chester is a good field for enterprise of any kind just now, and she will soon vie with Randolph in the production of iron ore. An excellent feature, too, is the record with which her people work for the general interests of the locality, and we only wish that it would culminate in the erection of furnaces and the manufacture of iron from the ores that are now sent to distant parts of the country.

A boy named Wm. Birmingham, ascending a shaft in the Swamp Mine Hill became fearful of having his fingers crushed and losing his hold on the bucket fell back a distance of forty feet. He received several serious injuries and had his ankle badly hurt, otherwise escaped without serious injury.

The National Lightning Rod Co. has among us, and its soliciting agent, Maj. H. G. Dennison is full of putting up their valuable contrivances. Our townspeople should avail themselves of the occasion to protect their buildings, for we are very sure that the rods manufactured by this company are superior to all others, and only in case of rare emergency. No workman than former Brockway was found, and his salesman, Maj. Dennison, is reliable and courteous.

Samuel S. Beach, Esq., having sold his present residence in Rockaway to J. S. Dickerson, has bought a lot of front on Main st., adjoining the residence of S. B. Halsey, do'd. M. He intends to put up a fine residence there to be finished by Nov. next.

It is expected soon to commence the erection of the Presbyterian parsonage, which will be built next to the church. The rolling mill is being rapidly put in place, and it is thought that from 60 to 80 men will shortly be employed there.

After many years' discussion the people of Rockaway have succeeded in having a foot bridge erected over the river on the main thoroughfare to the depot. It is built by extending substantial wooden beams outside the bridge, and floored with good thick plank. A solid wall of masonry now shields the pedestrian from the passing vehicles. In this town the question of a foot bridge over the river and canal in Sussex has been discussed by the oldest inhabitants since their boyhood, with no result except an acquiescence in the want. We'll see it next spring.

Albert R. Riggs, Esq., of Drakton, and Mr. Ed. DeCamp, of Morrisville, have leased the old Ogden Mine, at upper terminus of the Ogden Mine R. R. This mine is about ninety years old and was supposed to have been worked out some years ago, but recent explorations have resulted in such indications that these gentlemen are indeed prosecuting the enterprise. About the mine was given up, and while the men were engaged in removing the debris, a "cave" took place which killed two or three men many feet under ground. This rubbish is to be removed and a general cleaning of the mine before work will be done in lifting ore.

Thursday next, the 30th inst., will be observed in very many places, where the fires of patriotism still burn brightly, as a day of commemorating the deeds of those men who gave up their lives for this country. Here in Dover they seem to have been forgotten. No movement has yet taken place for the observance of "Decorations Day," and while the neighboring towns and cities are actively engaged in preparing for the occasion, we remain as silent on the subject as the graves of the martyrs. Who will move in the matter?

Almost daily the employees and others about the railroad station in this place are horrified at the narrow escape of boys and small children from being run over by the constantly passing trains. We have witnessed some of the most hair-breadth and hair-raising incidents of this description that ever maddened an engine driver. And yet the parents of the next child that goes through the mutilating process will blame the railroad employees for it, or if the latter should use harsh means in driving half-grown boys away from the depot where they have no business to be they would doubtless be prosecuted. Where is the remedy for the impudence and abuse which these boys bestow upon the railroad officers when warned away from danger? A convenient horse-whip would probably save life.

The Rev. Chas. A. Pitman, from Western Africa, a delegate to the general conference of the M. E. Church now in session in Brooklyn, will spend to-morrow (Sunday, May 26th), in Rockaway, and will preach in the M. E. church at 10:30 A. M. and 7:30 P. M. Mr. Pitman is a native of one of the savage tribes of Africa—was reached by christianian agencies and has for many years been an eminent minister of the gospel and missionary to his own people in that far off land. It will doubtless be a rare privilege to hear such a man tell the effect of christianity and modern civilization on a race to whom no light or hope has come till now, though they have been known to the civilized world for twenty-five hundred years.

The Sabbath School Anniversary of the Presbyterian Church at Rockaway will take place next Wednesday evening at 7:30 o'clock. Addresses will be delivered by Geo. Shepard Page on "Ragged Schools of England and Ireland," and by Rev. H. A. Butler, D.D., in Dover. Theo. Somers, Rev. S. P. Halsey, of Brooklyn, formerly pastor of this church is also expected to be present. Singing by the school and addresses from other gentlemen who will be present will make an interesting occasion to which all are invited.

## FROM SUCCASUNNA.

A considerable commotion was raised among the juvenile portion of our village on Saturday last by the sudden appearance in our midst of an individual announcing himself by a profane circumlocution, as a "Gor-dillo," and claiming to be a native of the far away western wilds, claiming great audience among those primitive sons of this land of the free and home of the brave. Though in what particular respect this distinction was achieved was not stated, neither the particular tribe from which he originated. From the bills scattered about, we were enabled to ascertain that he was an Indian bearing the euphonious title of Gor-dillo, that he was a great "un," and that he proposed "storing" the citizens with a lecture on Injuna in consideration of fifteen cents per capita, at the Succasunna School House on the evening of that eventful day.

The sage himself stirred up young America, who began counting their ponies, but the time and place on, and in which the lecture was to be given stirred up the Good Templars whose regular meetings are held on Saturday evenings, and at the same place appointed for the lecture. There was a collision of interests resulting in a riotous scene, near the Chester R. R. crossing, and the lecture of a lecture not previously advertised, extemporized, and gratis, by a G. T. Another raid was made on Chestnut Hill, the keys of the School House secured and formal possession entered upon by other G. T's. The illustrious glories of currency circulating among children, and being pointed in Good Templar fashion found himself completely out-generaled, and after surveying the premises where he hoped to gather a goodly number of coppers, finding no very extra accommodations suited to his purpose, and a slim turn of the juveniles, who knew the Good Templars better than he did, he procured the first best conveyance at hand for the Drakton depot and left in haste and supreme disgust. I have it to say for the Good Templars that they regretted the appointment of the Red skin falling on the same evening on which their own meeting was held, but they could not consistently permit any such proceedings to interfere with their sessions if in their power to prevent it. The fact that this eccentric lecturer had greater impudence to themselves and the community, than any lecture the "Bourbon-soaked humbug" was able to give them. The general impression that prevails is that the fellow was and is an impostor. This point we are not prepared to dispute, but we know him to be a drunken vagabond, and from the incoherent jargon in prose and rhyme contained in his "songs," we are inclined to believe him a lunatic also.

Lo, the poor Indian. On Sunday evening, last a union concert consisting of the Presbyterian and Methodist Sunday Schools, was held at the Presbyterian Church which was well filled, and the evening was well spent in the singing of hymns and the recitation of verses about church time. After appropriate services, the Rev. Mr. Halliday of Brooklyn, N. Y., addressed the schools and their friends present introducing his remarks by an expression of pleasure in meeting with them as an old acquaintance, and native of Morris county.

The address was very plain and related in which he gave a variety of his own experiences as a Sunday School worker, and as a laborer in the great world outside in the service of the Great Master. He also related a number of pleasing anecdotes calculated to illustrate certain points he wished to make. It was much gratified at the apparent harmony that existed between the two schools which was significant of the same sentiment between the two congregations.

## Morris County Courts.

The case of Dennis M. Duffy vs. Jacob H. Shuman which was being tried before the court when we went to press last week, was concluded, but no decision yet announced. The next case tried in the circuit was John W. Crane vs. Hanford Oenkolock. The jury was impasseled, and the case partly tried, when the plaintiff made a motion to amend his pleadings. The defendant then desired further time, and the case went off for the term on the payment of costs.

On Wednesday the court announced its decision in the matter of the application of Michael Sandford to keep a tavern in Madison. The application was denied. Judges Dalrymple and Kane vote in the negative, and Judges Dellecker and Fancher in the affirmative. The judges voting in the negative hold the local option law constitutional. Those voting in the affirmative held it unconstitutional.

The State vs. Frank Crooks, an indictment for grand larceny, was tried in the Oyer and Terminer on Thursday last, and resulted in a verdict of guilty. Washington B. Leonard, indicted some two years ago for adultery, and who left the State, returned into the court and pleaded guilty. Fined \$20 and costs.

Nelson Hinkle, the colored man arrested some time since for assault and battery and attempted highway robbery, was tried and acquitted. Child for defendant.

Stewart Doan, indicted for petit larceny pleaded not guilty.

The appeals were taken up on Tuesday, and are still being heard. They are tried before Judges Dellecker and Fancher in the new Grand Jury room, while Judges Dalrymple and Kane hold the other Court in the main court room.

There were forty-two appeals upon the list. The most of them were very quickly disposed of, some being settled, some not moved, some being non-suited.

The first case tried was Charles Banks, appellant, and Anna Pierson, appellee, an action to recover damages for killing a dog; Verdict for appellant \$40.

The next appeal was that of Amos Matison, appellant, and William F. Wire, appellee; an action for work and labor. Verdict for appellee \$100.

The next case was the Belleville Mutual Ins. Co., appellee, and John S. Able, appellant. This case is still on.

No court appeals have yet been tried. The case now on will about complete the jury appeals.

The case of Hudson Kitchell, vs. H. S. & J. F. Van Wagener, is being tried in the circuit. It is an action of lien claim.

Law of New Jersey—Continued.  
CHAPTER CXXI.  
An Act to amend the act respecting the orphan's court, and the power and authority of the said court, approved April sixteenth, eighteen hundred and forty-six.  
1. Be it enacted by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey, That the provisions of the thirteenth section of the act to which this is a supplement, and the same are hereby extended to all cases of trustees heretofore or hereafter appointed by the said orphan's court, who after such appointment have died or may die, or who neglect or refuse to act.  
2. And be it enacted, That in case any trustee heretofore or hereafter appointed by the said court under said act, shall desire to be relieved from the further execution of such trust, and shall signify such desire by notice in writing to the surrogate of such county, then it shall and may be lawful for the said court, if it deem proper and safe, to appoint some suitable person in the place and stead of the person so desiring to be relieved, and the said person so appointed shall give bonds as required by the said act of the person first appointed, and the said trustee relieved shall, on demand, turn over to his successor all moneys, securities, vouchers, papers and everything in his hands appertaining to said trust, which shall be a final discharge to the trustee so relieved and his sureties.  
3. And be it enacted, That this act shall take effect immediately.  
Approved March 26, 1872.

CHAPTER CXXII.  
A Further Supplement to the act entitled "An act respecting the orphan's court, and the power and authority of the said court," approved April sixteenth, one thousand eight hundred and forty-six.  
1. Be it enacted by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey, That in all cases where any executor or administrator, administrator or administrator of an estate, or otherwise, shall have filed any account or accounts, exhibiting the balance of any estate in the hands of the said executor or administrator, or otherwise, and the said executor or administrator, or otherwise, shall have been duly allowed in all things as stated by the decree of the orphan's court of any county of this state; that it shall and may be lawful for the said court, upon the application of any person or persons, to set aside and annul the said account or accounts, and make such order as shall seem just and equitable in each case of what shall remain clear after all debts and expenses shall have been allowed and deducted; and the said court shall have full power to enforce its decrees as aforesaid, by attachment, sequestration, or other process, and in any and every manner, and with like effect that similar decrees can now be enforced in or by the court of chancery of this state, and may cause and lawfully give to every one feeling aggrieved by any such decree of distribution an affidavit, the right to appeal to the surrogate of such county, concerning any such decree or the enforcement thereof; provided, that if any executor or administrator, administrator or administrator of an estate, shall appeal from any such decree of distribution or proceeding, or from the orphan's court as aforesaid, for the enforcement of the same; said appeal shall be filed within twenty days next ensuing the date of said decree of distribution or proceeding, or of the enforcement of the same; and the appellant with two sufficient sureties, to be approved of by the said orphan's court, shall give a bond to the surrogate of this state, to the effect, to wit: That the appellant shall pay to the said surrogate the sum adjudged due to the parties entitled to the same and conditioned to pay such sum, costs, interest and damages according to reason of any such appeal, if the said order of distribution and enforcement be affirmed.  
2. And be it enacted, That whenever personal property is bequeathed to any person for life, or for a term of years, or for any other limited period, or upon a condition or any contingency, the executor or administrator of any last will and testament, or any administrator or administrator cum testamento annexo, or otherwise, shall not be compelled to pay or deliver the property so bequeathed to the person or persons having any such life interest, or other interest, as aforesaid, until security shall be given in the orphan's court having jurisdiction of any such executor or administrator's accounts as aforesaid, and in such sum and form as in the judgment of said orphan's court shall sufficiently secure the interest of the person or persons entitled in remainder, widow, or the estate shall secure or seek in possession; but in no case or cases, where the person or persons next immediately in remainder shall be the final descendant of any such life tenant, or person having any limited estate as aforesaid, and said executor or administrator, administrator or administrator cum testamento annexo, or other person having said limited interest or estate as aforesaid be required to give security, as heretofore provided for in a greater sum than fifty thousand dollars.  
3. And be it enacted, That this act shall take effect immediately.  
Approved March 26, 1872.

CHAPTER CXXIII.  
An Act to organize and establish a State Board of Agriculture.  
Whereas, the national agricultural convention, at its late meeting in Washington, in taking action for the promotion of agricultural interests, resolved that the several states in which boards of agriculture do not exist, be requested to organize such boards by legislative action; and whereas, such a board in the proper exercise of its functions would become the center about which to collect the results of successful farming and from which to send out digested information in regard to the great questions of farm economy, tillage, crops, stock, fertilizers, reclamation of lands, training of farmers, &c.; therefore,  
1. Be it enacted by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey, That the board of agriculture and superintending of the state geological survey; the president and two of the professors of the state agricultural college chosen by the college faculty; three members of the board of visitors of the agricultural college, chosen by their board; the president or other representative sent by each of the state and county agricultural societies that may be in existence in this state; and such other persons as the state board of agriculture may deem proper, shall constitute the said board of agriculture.  
2. And be it enacted, That the members of the board shall hold office for three years, and their successors are appointed; except that the first appointments the members shall be chosen in three divisions, one third of which shall retire from office in each year, one third in two years; and the remaining third shall retire in the third year, and the appointments shall be made in the same way the first appointments were made; other vacancies which may occur shall be filled in the same way, but only for the completion of the term in which they occurred.  
3. And be it enacted, That the board shall meet at the state house, in Trenton at least once in each year, and as much often as may be judged expedient; and the members shall receive compensation from the state except for personal expenses when engaged in the duties of the board.  
4. And be it enacted, That the board shall appoint a secretary and prescribe his duties; he shall receive a salary not to exceed one hundred dollars a year, and may, with the approval of the board, employ a clerk or clerks, at an expense of not more than one hundred dollars a year; whose salary and expense shall be paid out of the treasury of the state.  
5. And be it enacted, That the board may investigate such subjects relating to the improvement of lands and agriculture in this state as they think proper, and may take, hold in trust, and exercise control over donations or bequests made to them for promoting agricultural education, or the general interests of agriculture.  
6. And be it enacted, That they shall prescribe forms for and regulate the records of the agricultural societies of the state in correspondence with them, and shall furnish said societies with proper blanks, as so as to secure uniform and reliable statistics.  
7. And be it enacted, That they shall annually, on or before the second Tuesday of January, by their chairman or secretary, submit to the legislature a detailed report of their doings, with such recommendations and suggestions as the interests in their charge may require.  
8. And be it enacted, That the secretary of the board shall cause to be made and published for distribution as full an abstract of the reports of the agricultural societies as he judges to be useful.  
Approved April 4, 1872.

CHAPTER CXXIV.  
An Act making an appropriation to furnish the legislature with a Digest of the Laws of this State.  
Whereas, it has come to the knowledge of the legislature that the Digest of the Laws of this State cannot be procured by the members of the legislature in a convenient and accessible manner; therefore,  
1. Be it enacted by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey, That whenever the Digest of the Laws of New Jersey shall have been published, it shall and may be lawful for the treasurer of this state, and he is hereby empowered and directed to forward by express, at the cost of the state, one copy of the said Digest to the address of each member and officer of the senate and general assembly of the ninety-sixth legislature of New Jersey.  
2. And be it enacted, That the comptroller of the state is hereby authorized and required to audit the bill for the purchase of the said copies of said Digest, and the treasurer of this state is authorized and required to pay the same out of any money in the state treasury not otherwise appropriated.  
3. And be it enacted, That the sum of money required to pay for said Digest and the same is hereby appropriated, out of any money in the treasury not otherwise appropriated, for the purchase hereof, and for the printing of the same.  
4. And be it enacted, That this act shall go into effect immediately.  
Approved April 4, 1872.
