Yale combination lock now found on every bank vault in the land, that it would be down every Saturday night and stay in *late* until the following night that of the household might enjoy it at a Sunday morning nap. At 7 o'clock on the 20th instant the Hon. D. L. & W. E. R. R. have probably noticed a work going on near the east or right bank of the Hackensack river, on the Newark Meadows, and wondered for what purpose so many men were employed there. Messrs. Decker and Edward Canfield, the latter a citizen of Dover, are about erecting a large blast furnace to be situated on a slight rise of ground, probably one-third of a mile from the Hackensack river, which may be distinguished from the surrounding flat country by the growth of a dense large tree. Already quite extensive means have been employed, and a vast ditch for the purpose of draining is being dug, while the filling in of the meadow, the grading, and laying of the road and rail from the Hackensack to the site of the proposed furnace are nearly completed. Among the trees standing have been erected for the workmen, and day by day the enterprise rapidly progresses. The wisdom of erecting a furnace on this comparatively out-of-the-way spot is made apparent when all things are considered. The transportation of ore, at least from this section, would be no greater going east than in the other direction, while the large iron interests of this section on the Hackensack and Erie roads, or the shipment of ore from the Hackensack region and other places would make it the most eligible location. A greater variety of coal can also be had at less cost, and a superior article of North River limestone can be brought directly to the furnace, and the limestone and lime required for the blast have been secured, with ample river and railroad frontage, and contracts already made for the different parts of the work, the whole to be pushed to an early completion.
