Feeding Growing Chickens. Feeding Growing Chickens.

As a rule, the poultry-raiser feeds his young chicks liberally; and this is necessary in the early part of the season. The feed for the first month is ground corn, wetted with water. This is a nearly unvarying bill of fare. Some give young chicks soaked stale bread for the first month. This is very good feed; and where the housewire has the time and the inclination to do the baking, it is all right; but it becomes burdensence where large numbers are raised and fed

extra fine chickens, feed them for the first month, at least once a day on hard-boiled eggs, crumbled and mixed with moistened bread crums or oatmel. The average poultry-keeper, however, will not see the profit of this method, and will not practice it.
