The Culture of Black Bass.

Seth Green, the eminent Piacieutturist, writes the following to the Forsest and Stream.

The question has many times been asked through your paper why black bass were not hatched artithically by the Cotamission. I have not answered it because I do not like to write, and because I thought that some one would make the discovery from actual observation. As it is so simple, I will explain. There are some kinds of fish that east their spawn, and the parents never look after them again. Nature has provided the young of this family of fishes with a yolk sac that turnishes them with food from seven to forty-five days, at the end of which time they are food and know enough to look for it. The above family of fish do not hatch one flat to every thousand that are cast in the natural way, and should be hatched artistically; and, if they were not, they would soon run out. HOW TO FISH FOR TROUT.

One day recently, as Hugh Bryan wa make that one prefers, there being great a diversity of opinion on this matter among fishermen. The Linerick hook has nearly gone out of date, and how if was endured so long is a mystery. The Kirby and Aberdeen have taken its place. Put no lead upon your line at any time; it kills the artistic and natural motion of your bait. Use, as the most killing bait yet discovered, angle-worm; and these may be much improved by being kept a few days upon clean moss in an uncovered, large-mouthed bottle, that they lany scour themselves. In baiting, do not yet the slightest attention to whether the point of your hook is covered or not; it is of small consequence, or rather it is more deally and better not to be covered than otherwise.
