BALT FOR CABRAGE.—A New Jersey gardener considers ask necessary to the development of cabbage, especially in places far from the coast. He finds them more crisp, of better flavor and to keep better when salt is used than without. He uses it as follows. A few days after setting out the plants, and when they are damp, either after. a rain or when, the dew is on, I take a small dish of fine salt, and walking sumpget the rows sprinkle a pinch of salt on the centre of each plant. When the leaves begin to form the head I apply alt again exattering it over the leaves. After this I look them over occasionally, and if I find plants that do not head, well or appear diseased I sprinkle the salt over freely.
