

Sheep vs. Porkers.
To eafely bring a pig from weaning to pork barrel requires nine to twelve nunths of time, twenty to thirty bushmonths of time, twenty to thirty bush-els of corn, good pasture, good pens and good fences. It is estimated that the Dover, N. J. Sept. 13th, 1877. good fences. It is estimated that the food alone for putting a bog in fit condition for market costs about two and one half cents for each pound of pork, live weight, produced. This would make the average hog cost \$6.35, if it were not for the cholera and other causes which frequently intervene, and make the hogs which the farmer finally succeeds in putting on the market cost him much more.

To bring a lamb from milk to market requires pasture which should be rich in good grass, but which may be so as broken and rugged as to be unfit for other uses. It requires a trifle of salt, as very little our, good shelter and some care. The total exponse need not exceed \$1.50 to \$2.00 each and twelve months time. The return should be, from wethers, fire to eight pounds of haveol, worth \$1.25 to \$2.00, and one hundred pounds of sheep worth \$2.00 to \$5.00. This will give a profit of \$2.75 to \$5.00 per hundred pounds profit. These are taken as average figures, and of course do en as average figures, and of course do not cover extreme cases. We have seen 84.00 per head offered here within the ast week for lembs which were less than six months old and weighed less than 60 pounds each, making the price per pound not much less than seven cents.

Beet Root Sugar Industry.
A writer in the Polytechnic Review gives some interesting statistics about the beet root sugar culture, and calls attention to the desirability of establishment of the control may supply the country with a million tons of sugar now imported annually. He points out the fact that if sugar should be made here the industry thus developed would require not only agricultural labor to reduce the raw material, but cost, machinery and labor to manufacture it, such that in short the introduction of a new basic industry would go far to relieve the depression from which the country is now suffering. Sugar beets have been extensively raised in this country for the purpose of feeding cattle, and the cost of growing them may be estimated from the result of small experiments of that kind. "The should be made here the industr. nall experiments of that kind. "The erage yield on eighteen farms," says e writer, "has been twenty-four and a the writer, "has been twenty-four and a half tons per acre, and the average cost \$2.42 per ton." He estimates from this that the sugar beets would yield the farmer a profit of \$25 to \$40 per acre, clear of cost of culture. This is a much larger profit than the average profit from grain crop in the United States during the last four veats. If the returns and estimates are anywhere near accuracy. and sugar bests can be grown here on ould be no difficulty in introducing the culture on a large scale for the man-ufacture of beet root sugar: and it is therefore, difficult to understand why it therefore, difficult to understand why it is considered necessary to unge protective legislation to keep out foreign augurs or subsidies to encourage farmors to go into a paying business. It may be desirable and politist to vote subsidies for the farmers, and high tariffs against foreign augurs, but, if so, it should be confessed beforehand that the best root sugar industry will unt pay without these sids. On the present showing, however, of those who advocate the new industry, nothing more is needed than to call the attention of farmers to the fact that they get more per acre from best roots than from corn to induce more than enough of them to abandon corn for boots.

Shooling of Herses.

For whatever purpose the horse is used, the shee should not be too light; because it is then liable to be born, and becomes an insufficient covering to the foot. The web of the shoe should be broad, and continued through the whole shoe to the heels, to give increased cov ering and protection to the sole of the foot. The outside of the shoe should foot. The outside of the shoe should exactly fit the crust of the hoof, thereby giving the entire hoof an 'equal bearing on all parts from the toe to the beel. The usual practice, its chave a portion of the shoe projecting obtavards along both the outer and inner quarters of the hoof; and when this form of a shoe is connected with a narrowing of the web at the heef, the effect is to place the upon the inside line of the web thereby producing an equal bearing up-on the ground surface of the foot. The setting off of the shoe at the heel is a great inconvenience to the horse when his great inconvenience to the borse when his foot sinks in the ground, and it is in this way the most of the aboos are pulled off and lost in the ground or trodden off with the other feet. It is evident when the aboo fits the foot of the thorse exactly, that when the foot is pulled up through the ground after sinking, the aboe must follow the foot without detriment or difficulty.

The shoe should be made sufficiently long to fully support the entire struct-

long to fully support the entire structure of the heels. The shoe should be of equal thickness throughout, and should be carefully adapted to the foot; od from entering the crust at the exact spot and in the very direction which they should, there will be a constant straining on the nails, which is injurious to the foot, and will be liable to chip pieces off the hoof. Fick the bunches on a dry, warm day, and place them in a cool, shady place for three days; then pack them in pa-per, boxes, holding about 10 pounds. Between the layers place a single thick-mess of newarner; the hoxes should hear of newspaper; the boxes should not contain more than three layers in thickness. Then place it a cool, dry room, not in a collar, for the dempness will cause mould and decay.
