Remedies for injuries to fruit tree re mentioned by Herr Lucas in a late work on Orcharding. According to him wounds of the usual sort are best treated by catting out the injured part, and amearing the parts laid bare by the incision with resin or tar. Washing them with water and bandaging with wet cloths, have also frequently produced good results. Wounds on the trunks of smooth-barked trees, caused by hailstones, should be smeared with a mixture of clay and cow's dung. 
