Apple Orchards.

There is no part of the farm that paybetter than the orchard, if it is properly cared for. While the trees in old orbetter than the orchard, if it is properly cared for. While the trees in old orchards are gradually dying out, but for young orchards are being planted. Beside the increasing demand for apples, there is a large increasing foreign demand, not only for the green fruit, but for the dried also. Since October 1876 there have been shipped to England 396,000 barrels of fresh apples. The average shipments last December was 20,000 weekly.

The working classes of Germany and Australia, are the chief enstoners for American dried fruit, abroad; and the poor people of England and Russin also nea them to a himited extent.

As long as dried apples can be experted from New York at 5 to 7 cents a pound. Europe will take all we have to spare. The best and most certain betters, and profitable apples to calibate are the Baldwins, Greenings, Euglish Russets and the Nextwom Pippins, where this kind does well.

To Winter Hogs.
