Brau as Food for Milch Cows.

We were surprised recently at a meeting composed largely of dairymen to hear the morits of bran as feed quoted chiefly on account of its value as an aprient, and for its keeping the system in good condition. It was not spoken of at all as an important milk producer and stimulant of the lacteal secretory organs, as it really is. We thought the value of bran for these uses was now universally understood in dairy districts. The demand for it is so great that it brings nearly double the price of Indian corn meal per ton, and we know of no substitute so profitable for milch cowsther caseen being that the chemical constituents of bran are those found in milk. We have turned to one of our authori-Bran as Food for Milch Cows. We have turned to one of our authorities and find that 100 pounds of bran (the mere bull of wheat), contains: water, 18 pounds, starch, gum and sugar 55, gluten, albumen and legumen, 18 and fatty matter 5. An analysis by M. Saussure makes 100 of the ashes of the brau of wheat contain; soluble salts 44.15, carably phosphates, 46.5, silica, 0.5, metallic oxides, 0.25, loss 8.6. These results explain the value of bran, so rich in the elements of milk and so rich in the demonst of mix and hones. For growing animals it is indispensable. Meal, as a fat former, and to keep up natrition, should be combined with bran for the other uses, two parts of bran to one of Indian meal being a good proportion.—Practical Farmer.
