Care of Sitting ilens.

If you suspect she is lousy, it is well to gresse her freely a day or so before the eggs are put under her, and a little her cosne oil is a grand thing to not on if not now too freely. After putting it on give time for it to evaporate before putting the eggs under her, as they will not latch any better for being oiled. You must make sure that she will not be troubled by other hear, or by rats, weare sels or skunks. Now you have her well under way. While sitting her food should be corn or other whole grain never meat. Some hens will need a little watching each day, to see that they come off to eat, drink and wallow in the Care of Sitting Hens. come off to eat, drink and wallow in the dirt. All this should not take mor than half on hour, when they should go back to their work. Without watching back to their work. Without watching, some hens will not stay off long enough for their health, while others will remain off so long as to allow the eggs to get cold and spoil. While the hen is off you should look over the eggs and see if any are broken. If so, remove them with all the shells, for fear the hen may learn to eat them, in which case you will find her nest capty before you get chickens batched. If a hen gots that labil, off with her head as soon as passible, and if she has any eggs under her, put them under another hen if you have one, and if not throw them against the wall.
