The Charter election in this town on Monday was quietly conducted by the voters of the Republican and People's tickets. At noon there had been 104 votes polled against 518 at the same hour two years ago. At half past five o'clock in the afternoon only about 800 votes had been polled, but after the close of the polls 877, or about three-fourths of the total vote of the town, had been cast.
