**New Jersey Legislature.**  
TUESDAY, Jan. 17.—Mr. Chase of Camden, will this afternoon introduce a joint resolution in the House, recommending to Congress the purchase of Independence Hall, Philadelphia, to be dedicated in 1878. The afternoon will probably be taken up with speeches on this subject, several members having prepared themselves.

The State Agricultural Society, in session to day, re-elected the officers of last year. There was a large attendance. General Frick was elected Vice President. George Richards, J. C. Little and J. W. Crane were added to the Directors. Wm. A. Morrell was put on the Executive Committee instead of Phipps Jones and George R. Damm made Corresponding Secretary.

Mr. Dyer's brother is here to-day, seeking legislative action to order a new trial, or at a stay of proceedings. He is not known to have any Senator or member espouse his cause as yet.

Mr. Mitchell, for the better security of cities and towns against contagious disease, authorizing the establishment of a board of health, creation of hospitals, compulsory vaccination, and disinfection in every incorporated city and town.

Mr. Ditcher, sup. to the Passaic Valley and Peapack R. R., now known as the West Line Railway, authorizing an extension from Essex into Hudson Co. at the Hudson river; also to construct branch lines from some point on their present line in Clinton township, Hamorton county, or from any other county through which that road may pass. Morris, Essex and Hudson excepted, to some point in Warren Co., near Phillipsburg.

Bills were also introduced to allow local option in regard of Gamblers.

Assemblyman Williams of Orange, proposes to have passed a bill by which the State can be authorizing to make a cut through Bergen Hill large enough for all possible needs of the present and future. This proposed cut is to be 300 feet wide, and is to be for the use of all other roads. The expenses to be borne by the State, and it is proposed to tax each passenger, during the first five years, one cent, in order to reimburse the State.
