POWERS AND DETIES OF TOWNS

COMMITTEES.
The only meeting of the Committee
during the year that is fixed by general
law, is that of the third Tuesday of
August, on which the Assessor is required
to lay his assessments before it for
revision.
The Committee should go over the
list name by name. If it appears that
any one has been omitted, assessed at
too low a rate, or granted exemption
by the assessor upon improper grounds
the committee must remedy these de-
fects according to its best judgment and
information.
It may issue subpoenas, examine wit-
nesses, and adjourn from time to time as
it shall find necessary for this purpose.
The Assessor must be present at the
meeting to explain his assessment, and
give information to the Committee with
regard to it.
The Clerk must present claims for
exemption which have been filed with
him.
If the Committee find that the Assessor
has granted exemption to any one
without having received and filed with
the Clerk a statement of all the taxable
property of the claimant, the amount of
the credit, the date and residence of
the creditor, made in writing, and
verified by his oath, or the creditor
resides out of the State, they must strike
out the exemption.
If property is assessed at too low a
rate, they should add such an amount
to the assessment as they deem just. If
any person who ought to be taxed has
been omitted, they must cause the
Assessor to assess him according to their
best information.
If property has been assessed to per-
sons other than the owner, executor,
administrator, guardian or trustee, they
must require the Assessor to correct his
mistake.
The Clerk must take a minute of each
correction, and record it upon the Town-
ship books.
Persons who are aggrieved by the cor-
rections made by the order of the Com-
mittee, have their remedy at the meeting
of the Commissioners of Appeals, to
which one of the Committee should at-
tend to give necessary information.
The next regular session of the Com-
mittee is the first Tuesday in October.
The Collector is then required to sub-
mit his duplicate for their inspection.
They should satisfy themselves that the
various claims are correctly added, and
charge the whole to the Collector's ac-
count. He then becomes responsible for
its full and just payment in the neces-
sary steps for its collection.
The returns of the Overseers of High-
ways should be received at this meeting,
and their accounts balanced. Claims
for over work should be carefully scruti-
nized, and its necessity fully demon-
strated, before ordering them paid.
As the lists are passed, the Clerk should file
them, and make out a transcript of the
credits due each person, which may be
given to the Collector, to be set off against
taxes of the individuals credited; or paid
to the Overseers, and distributed by them.
The former is the usual course. The lat-
ter is easier for the Committee and the
Collector, and it adopted generally might
lead to the people of the district in the
greater care in selecting their overseers.
The last regular meeting is the final
settlement on the second Tuesday in
February. Notice should be given, at
least two weeks before, to all officers
and creditors of the Township, to pre-
sent their reports and claims to this
meeting, in writing.
"Sleep Bills," or claims for damages
by dogs to domestic animals, are usually
brought in at this time, and must be
accompanied by the certificate of two dis-
interested Freeholders, stating under
the oath of one or both of them, the
amount and nature of the damage, and
that it was done by dogs whose owners
are unknown.
All bills presented to the Committee
for payment must be sworn to by the
claimant.
The Overseer of the Poor, Collector
and Constable, who have been employ-
ed in the service of the Township, and
the Justice who have issued tax war-
rants, must also report at this meeting
the amounts received and paid out by
them, and the vouchers for each pay-
ment, with their books of account.
The Collector must state the sums re-
ceived by him for the Township from all
sources, the amounts paid, to whom, and
for what purpose; the names and
names of those who have not paid their
taxes, and the sums due from each; the
amount of school moneys he has received
and paid out for each of the school dis-
tricts, and the balance due, if any.
His statement, if written out in full,
under the proper heads, is quickly and
easily checked off by comparison with
the Clerk's records, the check book of
the Township, and his vouchers. An
account properly stated is his satisfaction
often three-fourths.
The following accounts are to be al-
lowed him:
1. The receipts of the Collector of the
county for sums paid on account of the
State and county taxes.
2. The orders of the Committee for
the expenditures of the Township.
3. Deductions made by the Commis-
sioners of Appeals from the duplicate.
4. The orders of the District Clerk
for the moneys due the school districts.
5. Taxes, which through error in the
assessment, he has collected and paid
out, and which he is entitled to receive.
6. Taxes of those whose persons or
property cannot be found by the Collec-
tor.
7. The receipt of the Justice to whom
the Collector has returned any delin-
quent taxes for collection by a Justice.
8. The cash to be paid for account.
No other credits can properly be allow-
ed. Committee frequently examine the
power of authorization which does not
belong to them, in regard to taxes. They
belong to them, in regard to taxes. They
may correct the mistakes they have made
in revising the assessment.
They may release the collector from
liability for taxes he swears he cannot
collect, by using all the power the law
gives him. But they have no right to
excuse him from the payment of those
which he could have collected, and re-
spected or refused to do so, and they
are liable to the Township for the same.
The Committee ought to prepare or-
ders of the necessary expenditures for
the coming year, to be submitted to the
meeting for approval at the town meeting;
appoint a delegate to attend the first
meeting of the new Committee, and give
information as to uncollected or other
business, examine and approve the mi-
nutes and books of the Clerk, and its work
for the year is complete.
Each member is allowed two dollars
for each day of actual service, to be
paid from the funds of the Township,
from the New Brunswick Treasurers.

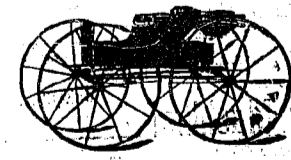
